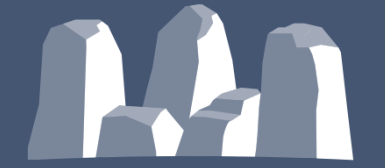

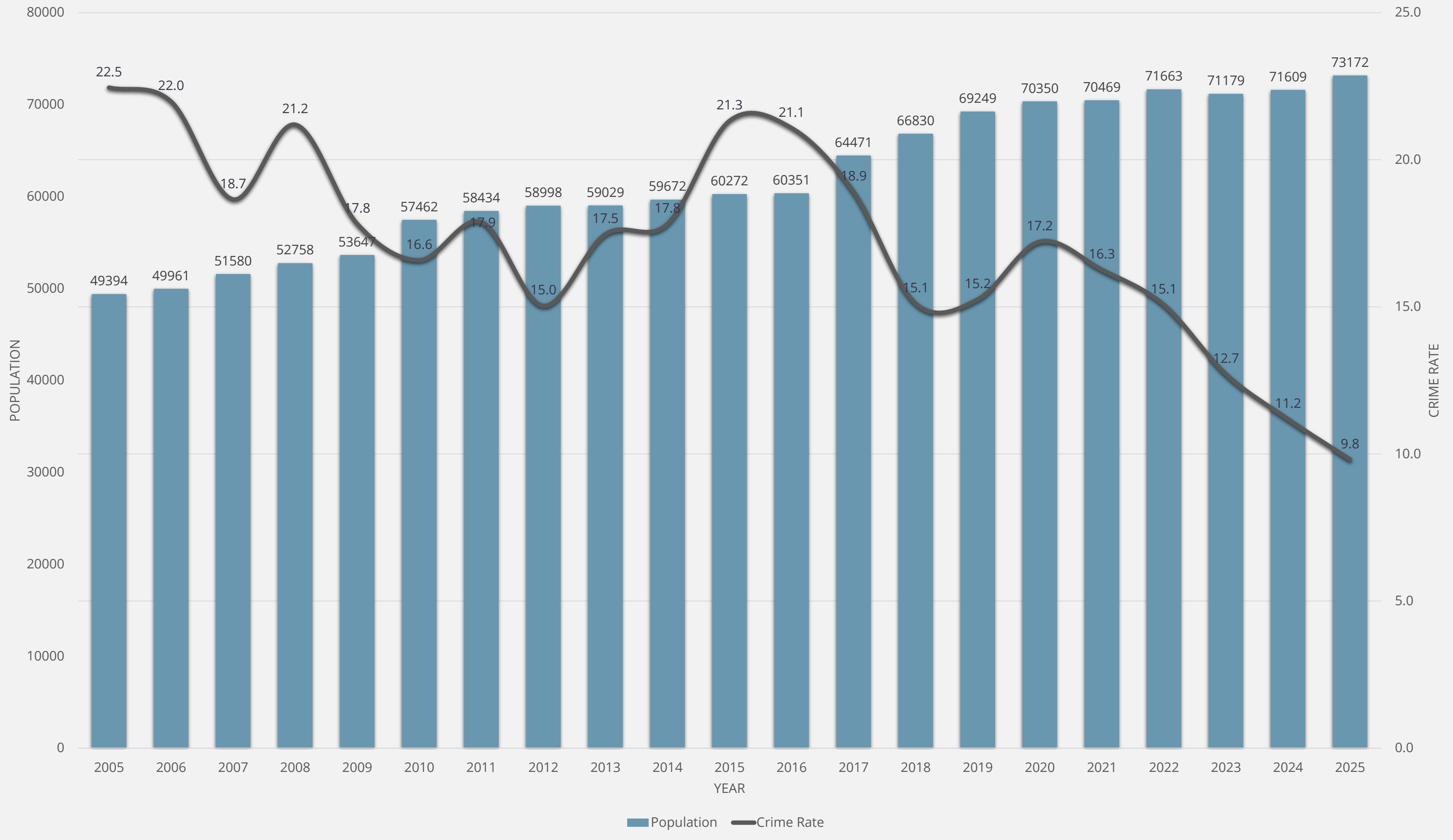

POPULATION and CRIME RATE



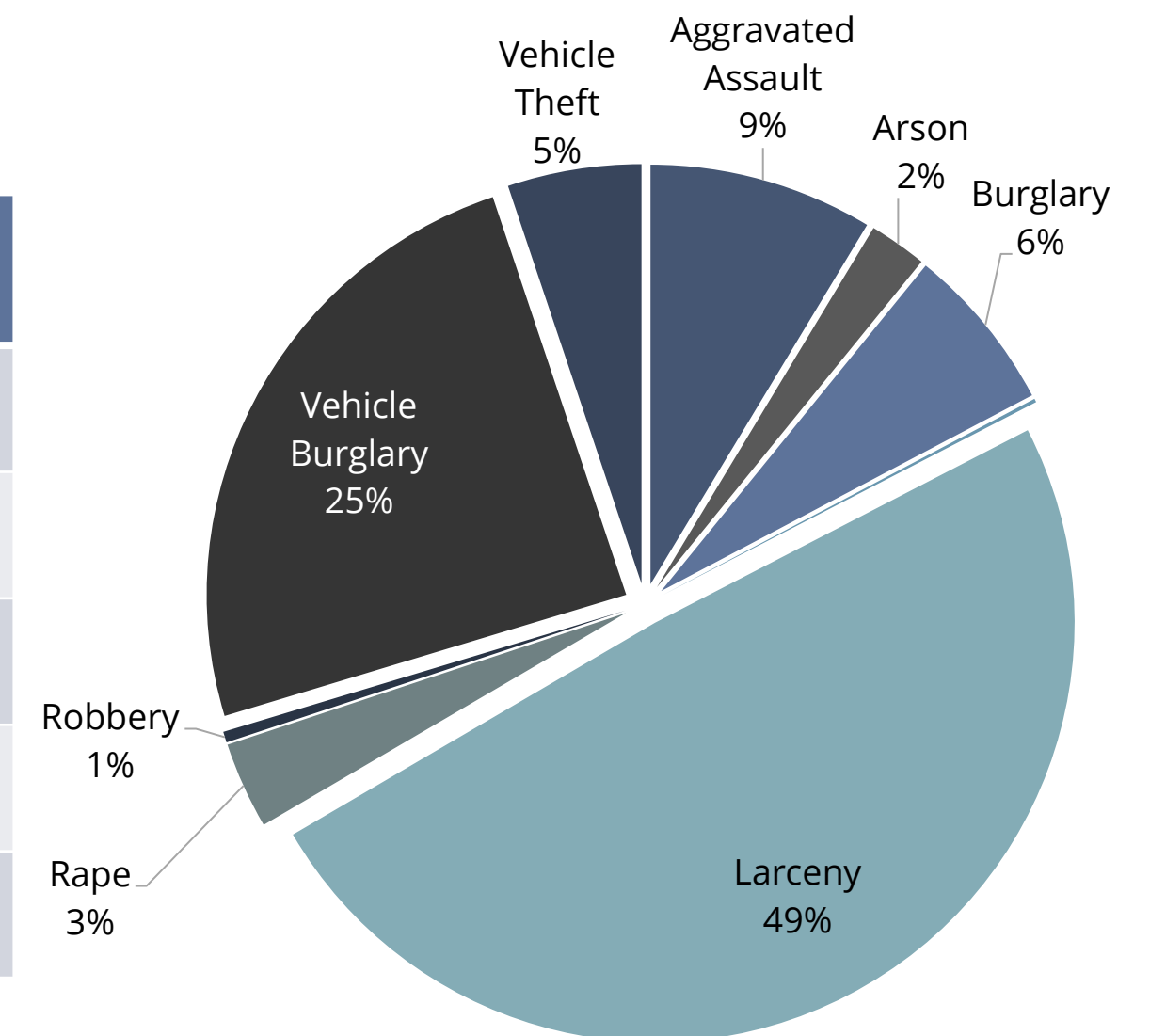

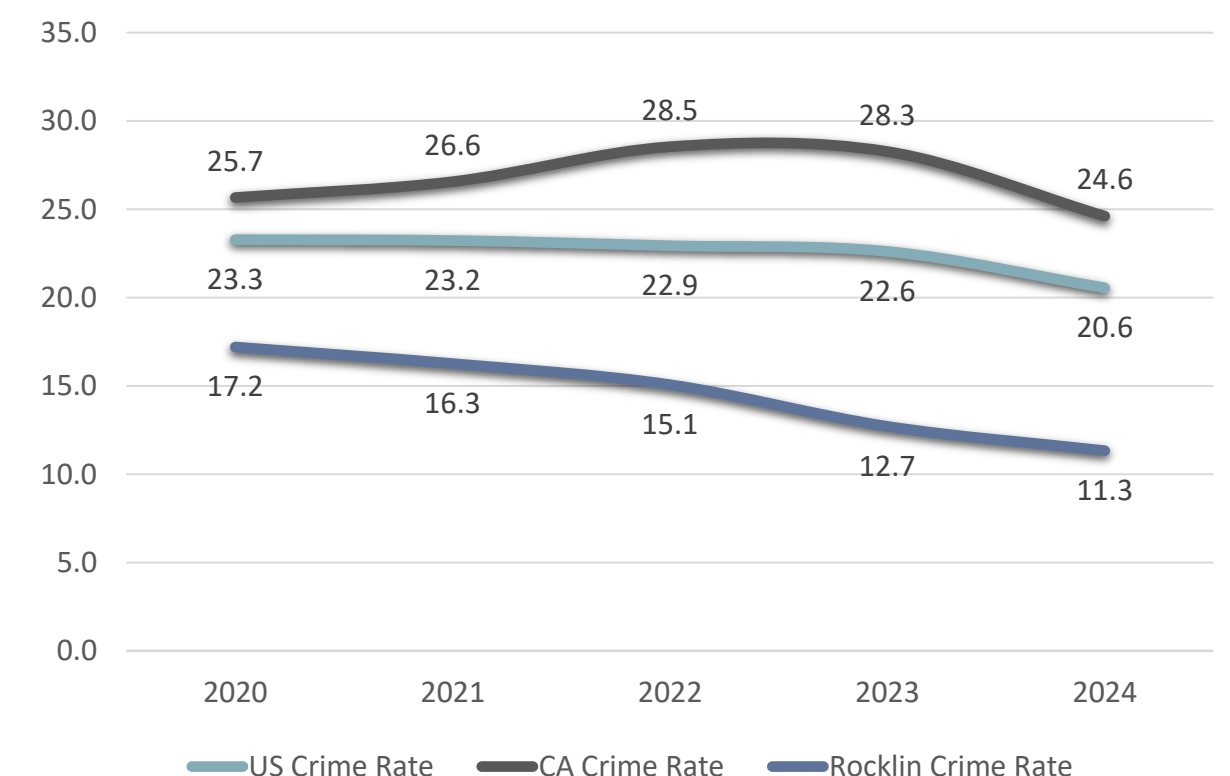

The Communications Center serves as the vital nerve center of public safety, operating around the clock to ensure rapid, coordinated emergency response across our community. As the first point of contact for those in crisis, dispatchers expertly manage high-stress situations with professionalism, compassion, and precision.

In 2025, Communications Center personnel handled nearly 70,000 calls, demonstrating their unwavering commitment to service and responsiveness. Dispatchers are responsible not only for answering calls, but for swiftly gathering critical information, prioritizing incidents, and directing police, fire, and emergency medical resources where they are needed most. Their ability to remain calm under pressure ensures that help is dispatched efficiently, even in the most complex and emotionally charged situations.

Performance metrics continue to reflect the Communications Center's dedication to excellence. An exceptional 96.68% of calls were answered within 15 seconds, and 98.71% within 20 seconds during 2025, exceeding industry benchmarks and reinforcing the Center's reputation for reliability and speed. Whether managing routine calls or coordinating responses to major incidents, dispatchers play an indispensable role in safeguarding lives and property.

The Communications Center's professionalism, technical expertise, and compassion form the backbone of emergency response operations. Their work often occurs behind the scenes, yet their impact is felt every time a resident receives timely assistance during a moment of need.

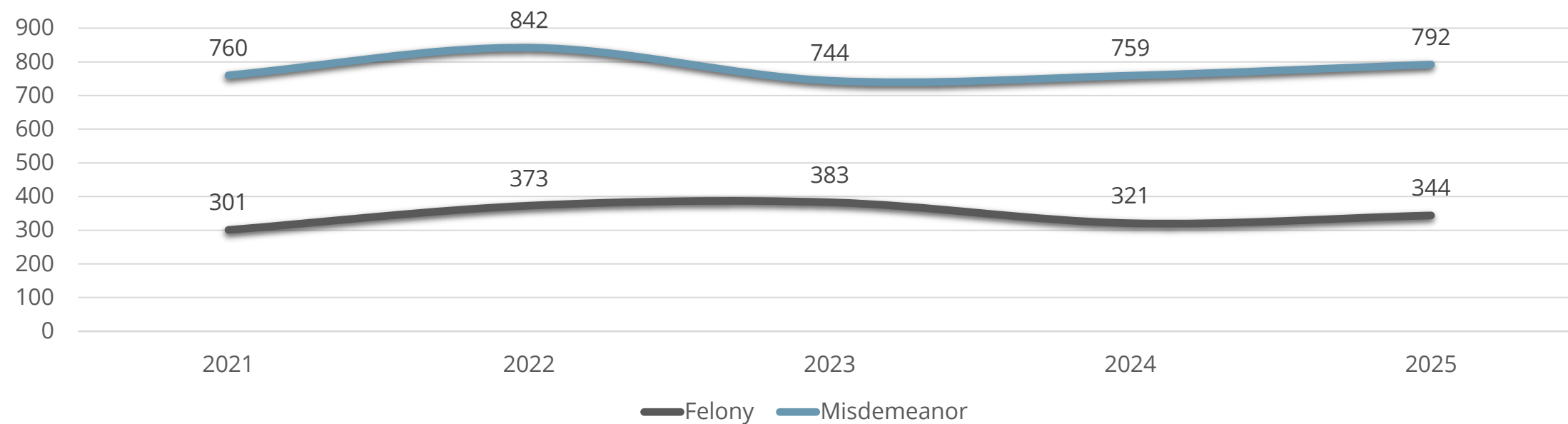

As the Department's largest unit, the Patrol Division serves as the primary gateway to city services. Our officers are dedicated to the frontline mission: "To Serve, Protect, and Promote a Safe Community." By building direct relationships with those we serve, we ensure that safety and community trust remain our top priorities.

Led by the Operations Captain, our team is comprised of 28 officers, five corporals, five sergeants, and two lieutenants. This force is strategically organized into six patrol teams to ensure seamless, 24/7 coverage throughout the year.

To provide localized and responsive service, the City of Rocklin is partitioned into four primary beats and 28 reporting districts. This geographic focus allows our officers to become experts in their assigned neighborhoods, fostering deeper engagement and more effective problem-solving for our residents.

This year, the department acquired Dallas, a two year old Belgian Malinois. Dallas is assigned to patrol with Officer Verber. K9 teams were deployed 41 times, with 22 apprehensions and two bites.

The Canine Unit assists patrol with building searches, area searches and evidence searches. They work closely with and support our local law enforcement partners.

LPR technology has been strategically deployed at multiple locations throughout the city. Since its implementation in 2023, LPR has proven to be a valuable investigative and crime-prevention tool. The Department continues to evaluate and adopt innovative technologies that enhance our ability to solve crimes and protect the community, while carefully balancing our commitment to transparency and the privacy rights of our residents.

The COPPS Unit was established in 2023 to support Patrol operations by addressing quality-of-life concerns throughout the city. The unit focuses on issues such as unhoused outreach, permit compliance, and proactive engagement with retail businesses and regional loss-prevention partners to deter theft and apprehend offenders.

The one Sergeant and three Officer unit work collaboratively with City departments, local Health and Human Services, Placer County Probation, and other law enforcement agencies and partners to provide coordinated and effective responses to these community concerns.

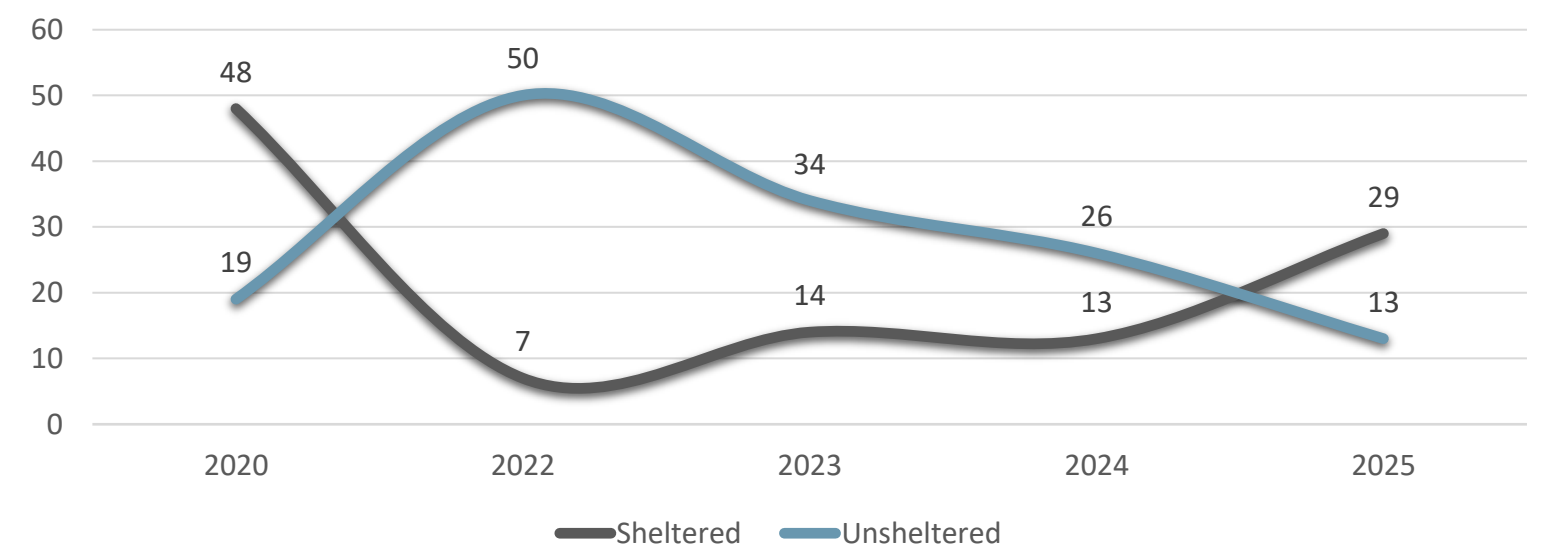

The COPPS Unit approaches citywide quality-of-life concerns with careful analysis and an evidence-based mindset. By fostering strong partnerships with community organizations and law enforcement partners, the unit supports constructive outcomes for the unhoused population through coordinated outreach efforts. From addressing organized retail theft and conducting permit-related business inspections to resolving neighborhood concerns and supporting patrol operations, the COPPS Unit consistently provides reliable, high-quality service to the City of Rocklin.

To build upon the initial successes achieved by the COPPS Unit, an additional officer was added to the team this year, bringing their numbers up to three Officers and a Sergeant. Although it is a relatively small team, their positive impact on the community is felt citywide.

In coordination with state agencies, the COPPS unit began addressing illegal products sold by smoke shops in Rocklin. In total, 18 inspections were conducted in 2025.

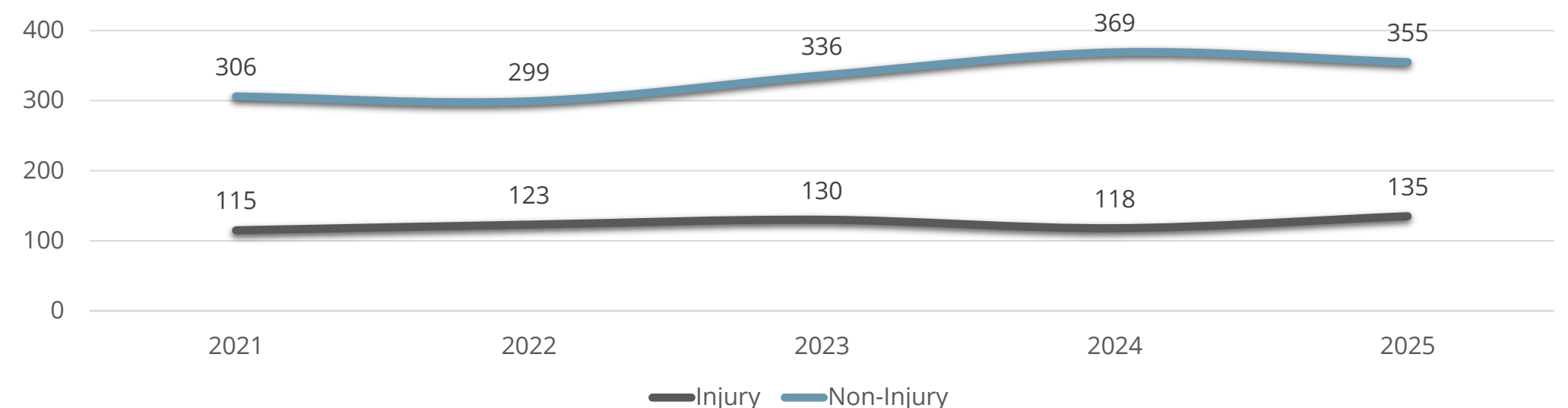
TRAFFIC COLLISION TOTALS REMAINED STEADY

In 2025, traffic collision numbers remained steady, totaling 490 collisions. This included 355 non-injury collisions and 135 injury collisions. Of the total, 106 collisions were classified as hit-and-runs.

The Traffic Unit is dedicated to improving roadway safety through education, enforcement, and responsive service to community traffic complaints. The unit addresses traffic-related concerns, analyzes collision data, and works closely with City Traffic Engineers to identify high-risk areas with the goal of reducing traffic collisions. Additionally, the unit has been instrumental in collaborating with various stakeholders in the city to address dangerous behaviors involving E-bikes.

Through a State Cannabis Grant, the department was able to purchase a mobile camera trailer. The trailer was used for traffic enforcement efforts in the area of Boulder Ridge Park as well as supporting staff on DUI checkpoints.

The Rocklin Police Department Investigations Unit is a highly skilled team consisting of general assignment detectives, an auto theft detective, two narcotics detectives, a forensic specialist, and a crime analyst. This unit works in close coordination with the Patrol Division, allied Placer County agencies, and regional law enforcement partners to conduct detailed investigations and ensure successful case outcomes.

The dedication and professionalism of the unit were further demonstrated through exceptional individual and team achievements. One detective was recognized for outstanding service and included on the prestigious 3rd District Congressional Honor Roll. Additionally, detectives led investigations into several serious and highly complex crimes that required detailed coordination and follow-through to identify suspects and build prosecutable cases. These efforts resulted in arrests throughout Northern California of organized groups that targeted our community, reinforcing our commitment to public safety.

During the reporting period, the Crime Scene Investigations (CSI) Unit provided comprehensive forensic support across a wide range of cases. CSI personnel examined a total of 599 latent fingerprints, successfully processing 57 identifiable prints and achieving 10 confirmed matches. In addition, the unit forensically processed more than 222 items within the laboratory.

Firearms analysis remained a critical component of investigative support. CSI linked four firearms to suspects and/or associated them with other crimes through the National Integrated Ballistics Information Network (NIBIN). A total of 66 weapons were test-fired, and 73 cartridge casings were entered into the NIBIN database. NIBIN technicians received a formal commendation from Sacramento County Sheriff Cooper in recognition of their contributions to the NIBIN/IBIS program.

Beyond casework, the CSI Lead demonstrated a strong commitment to professional development and regional collaboration by organizing the Forensic Professionals of Placer County group. This initiative brought together forensic personnel from partner agencies to standardize training practices and share case studies. The CSI Lead also established and conducted in-house training programs for CSI staff to enhance unit capabilities.

Community outreach and mentorship were additional areas of focus. A CSI employee mentored several Rocklin-area youth interested in forensic careers and served as a guest speaker at Whitney High School, where she presented and instructed students on the practical application of forensic science in law enforcement.

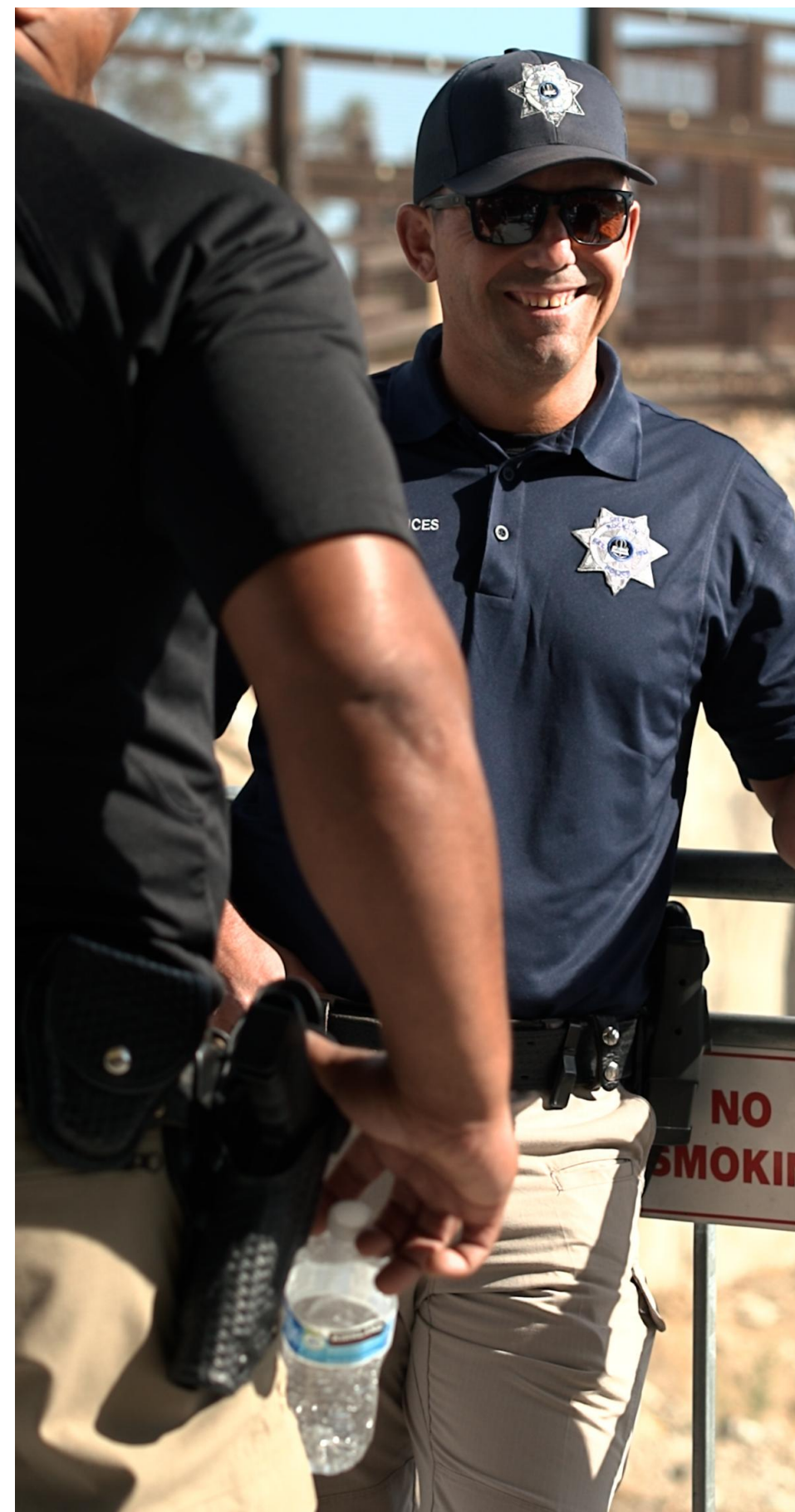

YOUTH SERVICES

The Rocklin Youth Services officers remain dedicated to providing a safe and supportive learning environment for students and staff at Rocklin Unified School District schools and Sierra College. Throughout 2025, these officers continued to offer meaningful guidance and personal mentorship, helping students grow academically, socially, and emotionally.

Additionally, in partnership with Rocklin Unified School District and Sierra College, we launched a dual enrollment course that enables RUSD students to earn college credit while studying courts, corrections, and law enforcement. The course is delivered with the involvement of Rocklin Police Department staff, giving students direct exposure to the criminal justice system and potential career opportunities in public safety.

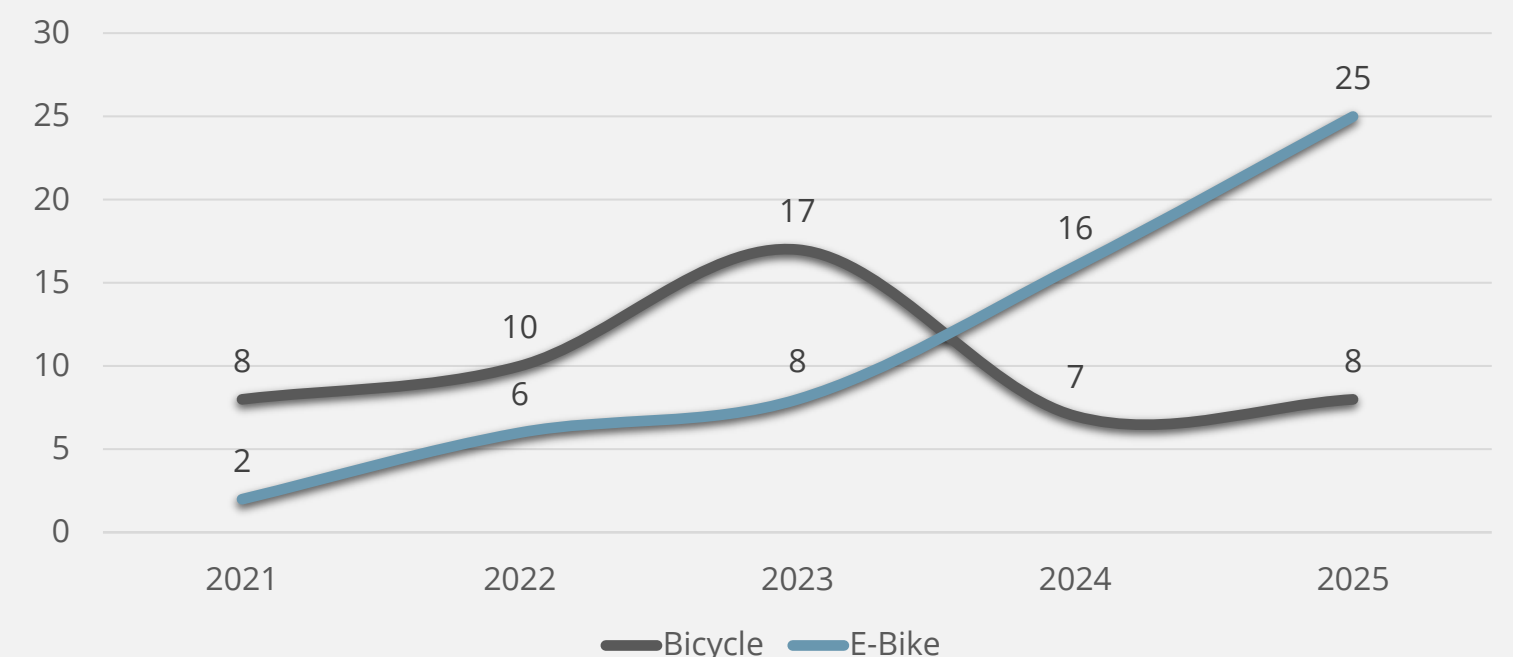
E-BIKES

This year, the Rocklin Police Department strengthened its long-standing partnership with the Rocklin Unified School District (RUSD) to address growing safety concerns related to the use of e-bikes by riders age 15 and under. As the popularity of e-bikes increased, so did the number of traffic safety concerns, near-miss incidents, and violations involving younger riders traveling to and from school. Recognizing the need for a coordinated response focused on education, prevention, and policy, RPD worked closely with district leadership to develop a shared strategy that emphasized student safety while maintaining a positive approach to enforcement.

A significant milestone in this effort came when the RUSD Board of Trustees demonstrated courageous leadership by adopting a policy prohibiting Class 2 e-bikes on K-8 campuses. At the time of adoption, RUSD was among the first and only districts in the region to take decisive action on this emerging safety issue. The policy reflected the district's commitment to protecting students while supporting families with clear expectations and consistent messaging regarding safe riding practices.

Throughout the year, the Rocklin Police Department delivered three formal safety presentations to district leadership, school administrators, and community stakeholders outlining local collision trends, enforcement data, and recommended best practices. These presentations helped inform decision-making and strengthened the already strong partnership between RPD and RUSD. The collaborative relationship between the two organizations continues to serve as a model for how schools and law enforcement can work together to proactively address emerging community safety challenges while keeping the well-being of students at the center of every effort.

The Property and Evidence Unit is staffed by one full-time Evidence Technician and two part-time technicians and is responsible for the intake, storage, tracking, and disposition of evidence, as well as the safekeeping of found property and items requiring destruction. The Unit supports the Rocklin Police Department and several regional task forces. As of year-end, the Unit maintained 19,506 items of evidence, representing a 10.22% increase from the previous year.

In 2025, the Unit handled a substantially increased workload. Staff responded to 554 requests from the Placer County District Attorney's Office, dispositioned 3,005 evidence items, and booked 4,956 new items—an increase of 24% over the prior year.

A significant portion of this increase resulted from a large-scale theft investigation that led to the recovery of over a thousand pieces of stolen camera equipment. Evidence technicians entered each item into the Automated Property System and conducted follow-up efforts to identify and return the property to its rightful owners. This project required sustained coordination among all Unit personnel for over one month.

Additionally, the Unit expanded firearms tracking procedures by entering all booked firearms into the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF) eTrace database. In previous years, only handguns were entered. This change improved firearms accountability and strengthened investigative support.

CRIME ANALYSIS UNIT

The Crime Analysis Unit is staffed by one full-time analyst assigned to Investigations. The analyst reviews daily calls for service, reports, bulletins, and data to produce actionable intelligence. She also conducts in-depth statistical analysis, identifies emerging crime trends and criminal networks to assist in suspect identification.

This information is shared department-wide, with law enforcement partners, and with the community to support informed decision-making.

The Unit also assists Patrol and partner agencies through information sharing, technology in the Rocklin Intelligence Center (RIC), and other analytical products, such as maps, bulletins, dashboards, and charts.

Over the course of the year, the Crime Analysis Unit played a critical support role for Patrol and Investigations, completing 101 requests for information through the RIC.

THE UNIT PROCESSED 4,187 REPORTS, 5,816 SUPPLEMENTS, 2,200 REPORT REQUESTS, AND 837 SUBPOENAS

The Records Unit plays a critical role in the daily operations and long-term effectiveness of the department, serving as the custodians of accuracy, accountability, and transparency. Through their expertise and attention to detail, Records personnel ensure that vital information is properly documented, securely maintained, and readily accessible to support law enforcement operations and public needs alike.

In 2025, the Records Unit processed more than 4,100 police reports, reflecting a high volume of activity managed with consistency and professionalism. Their work supports officers in the field, investigators, allied agencies, and members of the community by ensuring timely access to accurate and reliable records.

Beyond report management, the Records Unit handled hundreds of specialized requests, including over 670 allied agency report requests, 837 subpoenas, and 467 Live Scan fingerprint transactions, just to name a few. These services require not only technical proficiency but also strict adherence to legal requirements and confidentiality standards. Each task contributes to the smooth functioning of the justice system and reinforces public trust in the department.

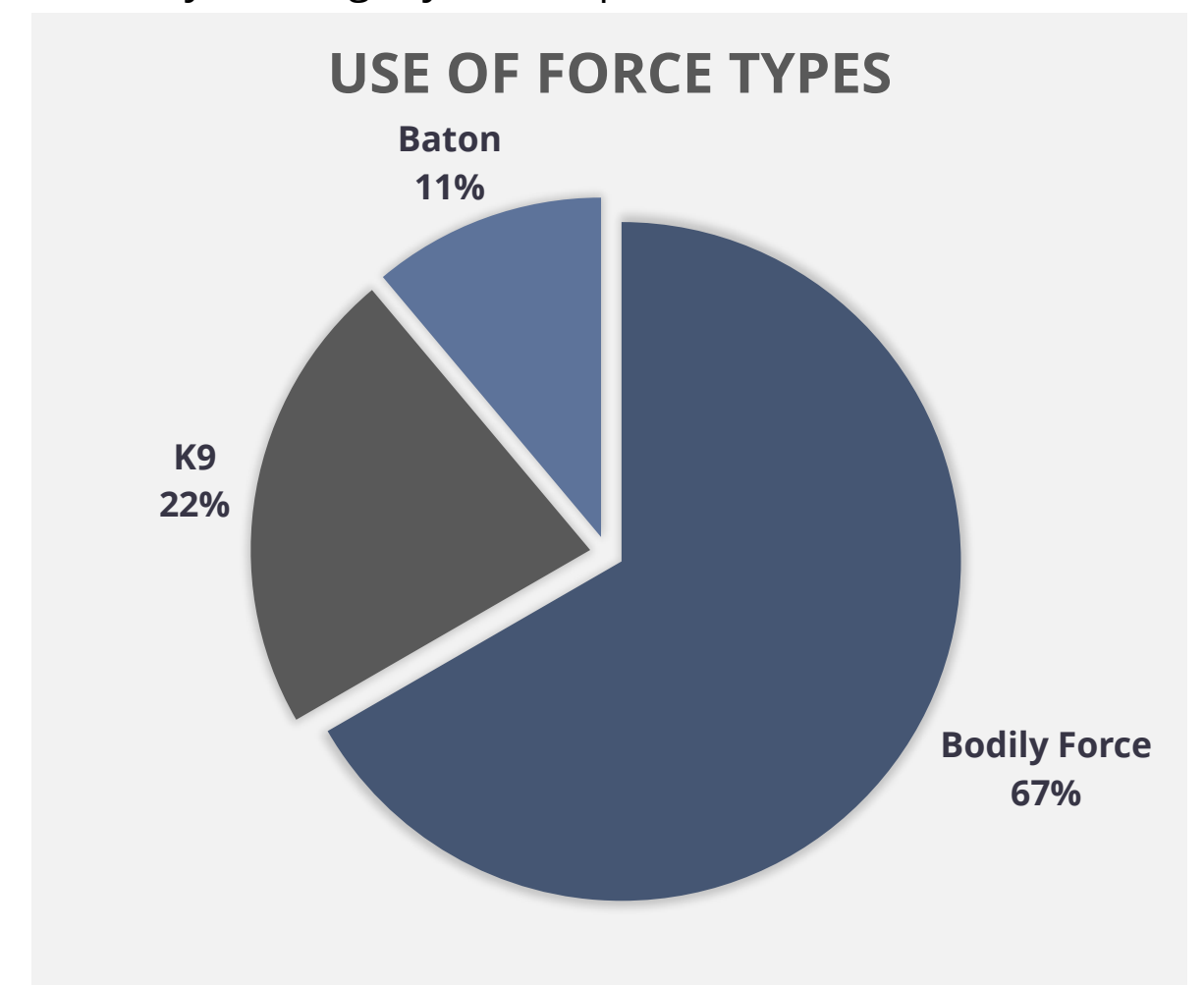
Through diligence, professionalism, and a commitment to service, the Records Unit remains an indispensable pillar of departmental operations and a quiet force behind community safety.

The Volunteer Unit represents the heart of community partnership within the Police Department. Through their dedication, generosity of time, and commitment to service, volunteers significantly enhance public safety while strengthening the connection between the department and the community it serves.

In 2025, volunteers contributed an impressive 6,800+ hours of service, providing critical support across a wide range of public safety and community-focused initiatives. Their efforts extend department resources while delivering meaningful, visible service throughout neighborhoods, schools, parks, and local businesses.

Volunteers conducted thousands of preventative safety checks, including over 2,100 business checks, 623 park checks, 473 hotel checks, and 402 school checks. This proactive presence promotes security and peace of mind throughout the city. They also completed 202 vacation checks, helping residents feel secure while away from home.

Community engagement remains a cornerstone of the Volunteer Unit's mission. In 2025, volunteers participated in 302 neighborhood patrols, and issued 320 72-hour warnings, supporting code compliance and neighborhood quality of life. Their outreach efforts included Child ID events, Buckle Up Baby car seat inspections, and public presentations that educate, protect, and empower residents.

From assisting with special events and neighborhood patrols to supporting department initiatives and preventative programs, the Volunteer Unit continues to be an indispensable force multiplier. Their service exemplifies civic pride, professionalism, and a deep commitment to keeping the community safe.



WELLNESS

DEPARTMENT GYM REMODEL

In 2025, the Rocklin Police Department completed a full remodel of the department gym, reinforcing our commitment to employee wellness and long-term readiness. The updated space was designed with both physical and mental health in mind, recognizing that a healthy workforce is essential to providing exceptional service to the community. The remodel included new fitness equipment, an improved layout, and a modernized look that better supports strength training, conditioning, and recovery. The refreshed space creates a more functional and welcoming environment for employees at all fitness levels and encourages consistent use as part of a balanced approach to wellness.

This project was made possible through funds received from the Officer Wellness and Mental Health Grant Program administered by the Board of State and Community Corrections (BSCC). This investment reflects our belief that wellness is not a perk, but a priority. By providing updated facilities and resources, the department continues to support the health, resilience, and performance of its employees, ensuring they are prepared to meet the demands of public safety today and into the future.

The Rocklin Police Department, in partnership with the Rocklin Public Safety Foundation, embarked on a unique project to preserve and restore an important piece of the department's history. Inspired by a historic photograph of the Rocklin Police Department's 1970 Mercury Monterey patrol car, captured at the intersection of Rocklin Road and Pacific Street, the department set out to bring this iconic vehicle back to life as a tribute to RPD's legacy and longstanding commitment to community service.

After months of searching, a donor vehicle was located in Colorado. Two senior members of the department traveled to Denver with a truck and trailer to inspect the vehicle firsthand. Following a brief but thorough inspection, the vehicle was secured and transported back to Rocklin, where it would begin its transformation and take its place as a lasting symbol of the department's history. Edwards Collision Studios undertook the yearlong restoration with exceptional care and attention to detail. The vehicle was completely disassembled, with the doors, hood, trunk, and fenders removed to allow for a full restoration of the body. Damaged metal was replaced, and the classic black-and-white patrol paint scheme was meticulously applied. The result was a restored patrol car that emerged in a condition exceeding its original showroom quality from 1970.

This restored vehicle now stands as a tangible connection between the department's past and present. More than a display piece, it represents the pride, professionalism, and service that have defined the Rocklin Police Department for generations, while honoring the community partnerships that made the project possible.
