RPD Partners with PCSO to Arrest Burglar by Sgt. Forrest Richardson

Rocklin PD Officers were recently flagged down while on a vehicle stop on Rocklin Road and Granite Drive. A frantic motorist advised officers that his vehicle was just burglarized at his residence in Granite Bay. The suspect had broken into the victim's vehicle and then fled the scene. The victim followed the suspect into Rocklin where the suspect abandoned his car and fled on foot on Sierra College Blvd. near Rocklin Road. A description of the suspect was aired by police units and a quick perimeter was set up in the area of Sierra College Blvd. and Rocklin Road. After about 20 min-


utes of searching, the suspect was located and arrested after a short foot chase.

The adult suspect was positively identified by the victim as being the person responsible for the burglary. Upon further investigation it was discovered that the suspect's vehicle had been "cold plated" with a license plate from a similar make/model vehicle. The vehicle's VIN number revealed it had being stolen out of the Sacramento area. The victim's property was recovered inside the stolen vehi-

cle. Additional stolen items were also located inside the stolen vehicle. Placer County Sheriff's Deputies that responded to the scene advised they had been searching for this suspect because he was believed to be involved in dozens of recent burglaries and vehicle thefts.

Rocklin PD Officer Westgate had arrested the same suspect a few weeks prior for vehicle theft as well. The suspect was booked into jail where he was held on \$1,000,000 bail this time due to his prior theft offenses.

Solar Panels Generating Almost 40% of Police Facility Energy Needs by Aaron Robertson



The Police Department solar paneled carport reduced our annual electricity costs by almost 40 percent during the first six months of operation (February through July). On average, our solar panels produced 791 kW of electricity permonth, or 36 percent of the buildings total energy consumption of 2212 kW per month. In May, the solar array produced 43 percent of the building's total energy needs.
