• **Recommendation**: Staff finds the proposed project to be consistent with the criteria within the Public Art Master Plan and applicable to this project and recommends approval by the commission.

BACKGROUND:

On January 26, 2016, the City Council adopted the Rocklin Public Art Master Plan per the recommendation of the Parks, Recreation, and Arts Commission. The Plan outlines various goals and strategies related to increasing and enhancing public art in Rocklin. One way this will be achieved is by encouraging and facilitating public art through private development projects.

The Public Art Master Plan outlines several criteria relating to public art including public art proposed within private development. The Public Art Master Plan recommends creating an Art Task Force that is tasked with initial review of public art projects, however due to the recent adoption of the Public Art Master Plan and the appointment of new commissioners to the Parks, Recreation, and Arts Commission, an Art Task Force has not yet been established. Therefore, the Commission will assume the role and function of the Art Task Force in addition to the tasks of the Commission as outlined in the Public Art Master Plan.

Applicable criteria as specified in the Public Art Master Plan that should be considered by the Commission have been incorporated into a checklist for convenience when reviewing this or future projects (Attachment 1). It is important to note that the Public Art Master Plan states that the choice of the artist and the funding of artwork are the responsibility of the applicant. Review of the public art is limited to the criteria within the plan.

Approval of the art element is the responsibility of the Parks, Recreation and Arts Commission, however the Commission's action and information about the public art project shall be reported to the City Council at the next scheduled council meeting or as soon as practical. The report shall include a brief description of the artwork selected and a photo or rendering. The City Council may request additional information and/or choose to have final review and approval for any municipal public art project if they so choose. This report and the Commission's decision will also be forwarded to Economic and Community Development to be considered by staff and the Planning Commission in their review and approval of the project. Although neither staff nor the Planning Commission can impose changes to the public art project based on the criteria set forth in the Public Art Master Plan, it is possible that other

changes as recommended by staff or the Planning Commission could affect the public art project. For example, if there are traffic circulation issues, staff or the Planning Commission may recommend changes to the site plan that affect the public art location or access. Should there be significant changes to the public art project based on ECD staff or Planning Commission recommendations, the applicant will be directed to resubmit the public art project to the Parks, Recreation, and Arts Commission for review.

Rocklin Station Public Art Proposal

The proposed Rocklin Station retail center will be located on Sierra College Blvd. adjacent to Interstate 80 and across from the Rocklin Crossings retail center. This retail center is tentatively scheduled to be reviewed by the Planning Commission before the end of the calendar year. Attachment 2 includes a rendering of the proposed art piece along with a site plan, landscape plan, and store elevations. This information demonstrates how the proposed art, location and context meets the criteria as set forth in the Public Art Master Plan.

- Sculpture: free-standing, wall supported or suspended; kinetic, electronic; in any appropriate material or combination of materials.
- Murals or portable paintings: in any appropriate material or variety of materials, with or without collage or the addition of non-traditional materials or means.
- Photography, original works of graphic art, limited edition prints, works on/of paper, original paintings.
- Earthworks, fiberworks, waterworks, neon, glass, mosaics, or any combination of forms of media including sound, literary elements, holographic images, or hybrids of media and new genres.
- Furnishings or fixtures, including but not limited to gates, railings, streetlights or seating, if created by artists as unique elements.

Ineligible Works of Art:

- Directional elements such as supergraphics, signage or color coding except where these elements are integral parts of an overall design created by a professional visual artist
- "Art objects" which are mass produced or of standard manufacture, such as playground equipment, fountains or statuary elements, unless incorporated into an artwork by a project artist
- Reproductions by mechanical or other means, of original works of art
- Decorative, ornamental, architectural or functional elements which are designed by the building architect, as opposed to elements created by an artist commissioned for that purpose.
- Landscape architecture and landscape gardening except where these elements are designed by a professional visual artist and/or are an integral part of the artwork by the artist.
- Any piece of Art that does not align with the City of Rocklin mission, vision, and values. (Profanity, politically themed, nudity, etc.)


