RPOA Leadership Meet with Chief and Captains

On Thursday, July 13th, Bart Paduveris, Trent Jewell, Dan Ruden, Ron Lawrence and I met to discuss the information brought forward by RPOA membership at their last meeting. RPOA President Bart Paduveris and V.P. Trent Jewel presented the information they had in a very professional and open manner. Our dialog was focused on problem solving and improving conditions throughout our three hour meeting.

I was very pleased with the level of articulation we received. I believe that we all gained perspective and learned of things we did not know. I want to thank those of you who took the time to bring forward issues and solutions.

Most of you attended the POA meeting where these matters were discussed so I will not reiterate them in this article, but I will talk about some of the activities that are already underway that will have a positive affect.

In regard to staffing in Patrol, the Human Resources Manager, Phil Wright, and PD Administration are actively working on increasing our police officer candidate pool. Those efforts include: lateral officer bonuses and relocation cost reimbursement of up to \$8,000 for each candidate and the \$500 recruitment bonus for police employees; hiring a public relations firm to assist in marketing; and enhancing our application and selection process. We met for several hours just this week on these staffing issues.

One suggestion brought forward by POA members talked about the concept of reverse evaluations for supervisors. Wow, we think alike! That was one of the first assignments I gave Captain Lawrence when he came to work. Captain Lawrence will be rolling out the Peer / Subordinate evaluation process for supervisors and managers within the month. By the way, that includes the Chief. We will be looking for the feedback with a desire of improvement.

Most importantly, I want each of you to know that we hear you and welcome the dialog. We too want Rocklin PD to be the best it can be and are willing to work very hard to that end. I appreciate the work each of you do and I know that your commitment is key to our success. Organizational change takes time and effort from all of us. Please be patient, helpful and open to the process. Believe it or not, we all want the same thing, and I'm confident we can get there.

Chief on the Loose

The arrival and settling in of our newest Captain has lead to better organization and distribution of responsibility. The command assistance has created a less hectic schedule for me and the ability to take a fresh look at how I interact with the service end of our business. In the process, I realized that I have not spent the amount of time I would like along side those of you carrying our mission out to the public. So I have placed time on my schedule to get out on patrol.

I began last week by spending some time with the weekday patrol shifts. Corporal Butler and Sergeant Richardson spent some time sharing space in their patrol car as they went about their business. Although it was with some trepidation that I put a vest on, (hoping it would still fit), I had a fun and informative experience. I really do appreciate the amount of dedication and professionalism I observe in the field.

It is difficult to stay on top of the needs and resources from my office. From my vantage, it is hardly possible to understand how certain issues impact our service. For instance, I am often called upon to comment how some of the new developments are impacting police and community safety. These visits in the field allow me to get candid feedback about these and other issues. More importantly, I will get to see the good work you are doing on patrol.
