Congratulations to Communications/Records Manager Jennifer Collins for her recent completion of Leadership-Rocklin! Jennifer applied to attend "Leadership-Rocklin" over one year ago and after an interview process was accepted to attend the 12-month long program. The Leadership-Rocklin program is facilitated by the Rocklin Chamber of Commerce, sponsored by Drexel University, and meets four hours once a month for 12-months. The program teaches leadership skills and has speaker/instructors from City Council, County management, public safety, the school district and CEO's of major companies. The classes examine key

issues that affect business in Rocklin, South Placer County and all of California. Discussions are held about government issues, transportation, economic development and the media. Students also learn about education, health & human services, the arts, volunteerism, Rocklin history and the City's vision for the future. Throughout the one year course, students participate in a community project of their choosing, and through this experience participants are able to use the knowledge they have learned to work together and serve their community in a meaningful way.

Jennifer Collins' Leadership-Rocklin cohort completed their project by teaching local highschool students necessary jobseeking skills such as resume writing, interviewing and completing a job application. That was the scenario that Rocklin Police Officers faced in their latest training at the Roseville Shoothouse. They responded to the shoot-house to conduct a probation search on Darrell Jantz, (role player). They were given information that Jantz had been using drugs and there was a lot of foot traffic in and out of his residence. The officers formed up their team and made a quick plan. Once at the door, they were confronted with different threats and obstacles. Before making it in the house, shots rang out and officers went down. An eye opener for many of the officers that saw first hand that inattention and compla-

cency can lead to disaster.

One of my goals, as a Firearms Instructor, is to provide as many "real life" situations as possible. With our partnership with Roseville PD, I was able to obtain the use of the shoot-house. We were able to have a house layout with multiple rooms and simunition weapons that are similar to paint guns. The officers wore their full duty belt with inert pepper spray, tasers with no darts and simunition handguns. They were given instruction on clearing rooms, watching angles, checking the corners, behind doors and covering their partners. Once they were comfortable with that, they were given patrol like scenarios with role players. Some officers came out of the house clean and some had some paint to clean off. Overall, the training was a success and hopefully all officers thought about our main goal: To get ourselves and our partners home safe at the end of shift while protecting the ones we serve.



Reflection by Sergeant Trent Jewell

"We can and will never stop moving forward but we will not forget what has passed."

2009 - It began with an innocent comment: "It's sure quiet tonight." But the quiet was broken and innocence was lost at 0040 hours on New Years Day. An event that began as an armed robbery call changed the lives of many. We all know that there is nothing "routine" about any call in our line of work. Something did not seem right when the call came. A sixth sense, a gut feeling - call it what you may - but all was not right. By the end of the call at 0121 hours, four Rocklin officers and

two CHP officers gave up their innocence that morning and did not hesitate when duty called. Each one of them lost something that morning that they will never get back. A family lost a loved one, lives were changed. An event like this is hard to comprehend for some, and for others, part of what we are called to do.

It is human nature to run from danger but there are groups of people that are called to run towards it. Soldiers, firefighters and police officers are a few of the groups that are called to defend others when that danger comes. Police officers respond to situations where people are often at their worst. We see things that others don't want to see and would prefer not to

know about. We are all human, we all stumble and make mistakes but the Police are held to a higher standard because we are the caretakers and peacemakers that have to decide the fate of others sometimes in a split second or in a blink of an eye. Not many people want that responsibility but the Rocklin and CHP officers that responded that night took that oath and shouldered that responsibility. It has taken its toll because we are human. We have emotions and we all want to go home at the end of our shift to our families. No one wants to be put into that situation because the outcome affects everyone.

I will not forget the sacrifice

each officer made that morning and the loss of innocence that we will never get back. I was never prouder of any group of men than I was that morning. Each one is a hero in my eyes as they acted without hesitation to protect our citizens and each other. Each one stands proud knowing that we will each be there for the other whenever we are called. Gratefully few will know the bond that comes from an event like this. We may all go separate ways and end up on different shifts but we all carry the memory of weekday graves on New Years Day.
