Rocklin Reserve Officers Return to School, by Reserve Officers Doug Vance and Ron McCray

Rocklin Police Department's reserve officers recently paid a visit to all ten of Rocklin's elementary schools in early October. The visits were part of a safety program developed to educate the students on bicycle safety. The reserve officers, along with multiple police volunteers, bike unit, and motor units educated approximately 2500 students on the dangers involving bicycles, motor scooters and skateboards. The Bicycle Safety Program is designed to create a better understand-

ing of city ordinances and the rules of the road.

The program consisted of four different stations for the students to visit. The stations included, patrol vehicles, a police bicycle, motor units and a four-way intersection where the students with their bicycles were able to test their skills. At each station the officers gave specific instruction including: how to use hand signals, bicycle maintenance and the importance of wearing a properly fitted bicycle helmet.

In addition to the hands-on workshops, the police volunteers also distributed brochures that included bicycle safety basics and fun games to test the students on what they had learned.

Thanks to the help of the police volunteers, Rocklin's youth are a little safer. Rocklin's reserve officers will continue to grow the Bicycle Safety Program into a full-day event for the entire community in spring of 2008.

In addition to his regular duties, Michael Nottoli coordinates the Citizen Academy, a model Neighborhood Watch program, Business Watch, and Rocklin's highly successful annual National Night Out event. He coordinates Print-a-Kid, Project Child Safe, and Robbery Awareness Prevention training and he

tion team (MAIT) with collision scene documentation (Factual Diagram). The new equipment will enable the members to set-up at collision scenes and accurately document the roadway and vehicles with less disruption to traffic.

The Lincoln Police Department also purchased the same equip-

ment and is jointly working with Rocklin Police Department on monthly training. As with all new equipment it is important to become proficient in its use, so may see us at several intersections in Rocklin and Lincoln documenting the roadway for future use.

Grand Jury Visit by Lt. Lon Milka

On November 7th, six members of the Placer County Grand Jury came to inspect our Temporary Holding Facility. Sgt. Trent Jewell led the jurors on the informative tour, all the while answering their many questions. Logs were checked, cells were examined, and day-to-day activities were scrutinized.

The Grand Jury reviews and evaluates procedures, methods and systems used by governmental agencies to determine

whether they comply with the stated objectives of the agency and if their operation can be made more efficient and effective. It may inquire into any aspect of county/city government to ascertain that the best interests of Placer County residents are being served. The Penal Code requires the Grand Jury to inquire into the condition and management of all jails within the County.

The Jurors ended up the

morning by getting a tour of the entire facility and were impressed by the department's structure, layout, and newness. Thanks to all who helped in making our temporary holding facility the clean and functional operation that it is.

Last year, the Grand Jury had the following to say about the Rocklin Police Department and its temporary holding facility in its report to the Superior Court:

FINDINGS:

The Grand Jury found the Rocklin Police Department complies with the applicable penal code sections dealing with the processing and holding of persons in custody. The Grand Jury commends this department for its cooperation and staff support. We found this department is well maintained, well managed and a credit to the community it serves.

Volunteer Academy Graduates 19, by Captain Ron Lawrence

Rocklin PD and CrimeMapper, by Lt Lon Milka

The Sacramento Bee online CrimeMapper tool is used for seeing where crimes, that is, most classifications of crimes, have occurred within some cities in the Sacramento area. One can search a specific address within a specific time frame for all types or specific types of crimes and the results will show criminal activity for the neighborhood. The results are based on a user-selected radius parameter.

Rocklin has recently been added

to the small group of cities that supply data to the Bee for CrimeMapper. The site is currently in beta testing and is hosted on an external site, crime-map.scoopytube.com. However, it can be reached through www.sacbee.com/crimemapper.

The data from the Rocklin Police Department is sent to the Bee in the form of an Excel spreadsheet. Crime Analyst Wendy Smith was instrumental in the creation of our comprehensive

crime reports and Dispatch Supervisor Jennifer Stroble spent hours creating 2006 and 2007 spreadsheets for use by the Bee. She had to export case data from RIMS to Excel and then extensively massage those reports into a comprehensible format. Jen said, "This project definitely gave me a new perspective. Compared to other cities of similar size, Rocklin crime statistics are impressively low. I truly think this is a reflection of all members of the department. Good job

everyone.
