The use of E-CARS not only streamlines our processes, but also positively influences the workflow at DOJ.

Rocklin PD has been asked to serve as the host agency for a grant-funded Placer County pilot program to test the usage of mobile identification equipment. Patrol officers will be provided high resolution wireless devices capable of iris, facial, and fingerprint capture to assist in verifying the identity of those contacted in the field. We hope to sustain the Coffee with a Cop program and to move the event to different

parts of the city.

Observant patrol officer Jay Newton discovered four catalytic converters within a vehicle that he had stopped for a traffic infraction. Three Rocklin Officers Recognized by MADD by Lieutenant Jamie Knox



On April 25, 2013, three of Rocklin's finest were recognized at the annual Mother's Against Drunk Driving (MADD) awards banquet. Officers Greg Jensen and Jason Maschmeyer received special recognition awards for their contribution to stop the crime of DUI.

Sergeant Eric Dollar also received a special award that is reserved for supervisors who lead the charge in the fight against DUI. Sergeant Dollar has arrested 15 offenders for DUI since being promoted to sergeant and continually trains his officers on the detection and apprehension of offenders. This is no small feat due to a patrol sergeant's demanding schedule and workload. This is Officer Maschmeyer's first DUI award while employed with Rocklin, and this is Officer Jensen's third DUI award. We are extremely proud of these very talented professionals.

It is no surprise that these officers received MADD awards. They all work together and have made DUI enforcement a top priority;

due in part to how close to home this crime hits. The City of Rocklin has lost several of its citizens, and one of our police department's own officers to this senseless crime over the years. In 2005, Rocklin Police Officer Matthew Redding was struck and killed by a DUI driver while conducting traffic control on Highway 65. These tragedies are indelible reminders of how DUI can impact the lives of a small community like Rocklin.

According to MADD, every 53 minutes on average, someone is killed in a drunk driving crash in this country. Every 90 seconds, someone is injured. Since MADD's inception in 1980, law enforcement and MADD have worked together to reduce the crime of DUI. In three decades, we have reduced the death-toll by half in this country, but the fact remains that future deaths are preventable.

With summer upon us, citizens will undoubtedly be celebrating holidays and attending summer events and festivals. The Rocklin Police Department would like to remind everyone to drink responsibly, designate a sober driver, and avoid

driving when taking certain medications. In the last decade, Rocklin Police have arrested over 2,000 DUI drivers in this city. Just imagine how many drivers are undetected. This is why motorists need to be extra vigilant when driving. Check your surroundings often and avoid becoming distracted by the radio and cell phones. Pedestrians and bicyclists should also be very cautious and obey all of the rules of the road.
